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## 1. Introduction



## 2. Previous Event



#### Our September meeting was Lecture Recital on the Wesleys

#### Nigel Holdsworth, President, writes:

I was looking forward to meeting Dr Simon Lindley again and his jolly face coupled with an ebullient greeting as he emerged from the taxi showed that he hadn't changed one little bit!

As Master of the Music at Leeds Parish Church (now re-named as Leeds Minster) since 1975; Simon, successor to SS Wesley who was organist at Leeds 1842-1849 confidently demonstrated his depth of scholarship and authority and deep love of the subject.

To call this afternoon's event a 'lecture recital' is to do it an injustice, Simon's entertaining delivery and brand of humour that is distinctly his own took us way beyond the dry factual biographical detail and list of compositions of the musical Wesley family and into the long-vanished society in which they lived.

Comparisons and links with other composers were made, social conventions and etiquette were drawn into the argument, connections with freemasonry, the hierarchy of the church, compositional techniques in common with Finzi and John Ireland all contributed to the richness of the detail.

Interesting gossip was also hinted upon regarding W T Best, Henry Smart and Dr Spark; three great performers from the organ world of the nineteenth century.

Words were interspersed with performances of the music and sitting back in my pew at the front of York's historic Central Methodist, I was transported back two centuries and I tried to reconstruct in my mind the musical world of the early nineteenth century. How different then: the range of the keyboards, a less stable wind supply, reliance on the skill of the blower, far fewer stops, a more gentler sound, an unequal temperament, natural light or candles, probably a complete lack of knowledge of the baroque composers and certainly no pedals. I found it almost impossible to un-invent the modern instrument and the mass of repertoire that we now take for granted and call our own.

The resources on the instrument at Central Methodist are light-years away from those available to the Wesleys yet the music sounded authentic and convincing. Simon's playing and stop changing has always been kaleidoscopic - hand registration too, and his page turning is a treat to observe. The music quite simply came alive.

Simon played works by Samuel, Charles (not the one that wrote hymns - there was another one) and Samuel Sebastian Wesley with a grace and fluency that quickly brought it home to me as I listened that when I have played these pieces occasionally in the past, I have been trying to make them sound beefy, like Mendelssohn's Third Sonata in A. I really have been missing the point. These works come to life as chamber works. In terms of piano music, more like Schumann on an historic piano (and less like Rachmaninov).




#### **HULL ORGAN COMPOSERS**

#### By Maximillian Elliott

#### **Born**

Afired Hollins (1865-1942) was born in Hull and is the city's most famous organ composer. He studied at Norwood College for the Blind and the Wilberforce School for the Blind, York. He studied the piano with von Bülow in Berlin. He was organist of St John's Church, Redhill and St Andrew's Church, Upper Norwood, prior to his appointment in 1897 at Free St George's Church, Edinburgh, where he remained until his death. Hollins became famous across the country for his 'popular' piano and organ recitals. In addition to his recital work, he composed a great deal of church music, songs and piano music. 

**Cyril William Bowdler** (1839-1918) was born in Hull in 1839. A pupil of John Camidge and Sir Robert Prescott Stewart, he was briefly honorary organist of All Saints' Church, Aldershot. Bowdler published the following organ pieces:







#### St Augustine's Church






#### **Christ Church**

Edward William Healey (1850-1922) was born in Hull on the 24<sup>th</sup> of March 1850. After taking lessons with Thomas Craddock, he became organist of Christ Church, Hull. He was known for his 'extremely retiring disposition and his admirable musicianship, which evidenced itself particularly in fugue writing and fugue playing'. In order to devote more time to organ playing, he briefly gave the position of choirmaster at Christ Church over to Walter **Porter**. He took a strong interest in the Hull Society of Organists and taught a harmony class. In April 1877, he moved to Sunderland Parish Church and the United Presbyterian Church in Helensburgh, Scotland. #### **Holy Trinity Church**

**Mathias Hawdon** (1730-1787) was organist of Holy Trinity Church, Hull before becoming organist of Beverley Minster. He later moved to St Nicholas' Church, Newcastle and was buried beneath its organ. He published the following organ pieces:



**Norman Ewart Strafford** 

Norman Ewart Strafford (1889-1957) was born in Leeds. He was organist of Holy Trinity Church from 1929-50 and Hull City Hall at the time of the organ's rebuild in 1951. He was principal accompanist to the Leeds Philharmonic Society and conducted the Calveley Choral Society and Hull Choral Union. In addition, he taught at Woodhouse Grove School. As well as composing anthems and songs, Strafford published one organ piece:




#### **Hull University**



#### **Queen's Hall**


John Arthur Meale (1880-1932) was born in Slaithwaite, near Huddersfield. He gave his first organ recital in Stockport to an audience of over 1,000 people at the age of 14. He was organist of the Queen's Hall from 1905 to 1912. Before that he was organist of the Congregational Church, Marsden (1896-99) and the Wesleyan Church, Selby (1899-1905). In 1912, he became organist of the Methodist Central Hall, Westminster. A noted recitalist, he opened many new organs in non-conformist churches. He also composed anthems, songs and organ pieces. 
#### All Saints' Church

Henry Ernest Nichol (1862-1926) was a civil engineer before becoming an assistant organist at All Saints' Church, Hull. He was later organist of St Andrew's Church, Kirk Ella. He had a teaching post in Hull and composed cantatas, church music and songs. Some of his works were signed 'Colin Sterne' (almost an anagram of Ernest Nichol).

#### St James' Church


#### & St Thomas' Church

John William Hudson (1856-1923) was appointed as organist of St James' Church in April 1893. Previously, he had been the organist of St Thomas' Church, Hull for eight years. He was also the conductor of the Hull Vocal Society between 1888-1896 and Hull Philharmonic Society from 1891. He composed an overture for the HPS at its inauguration in 1882. As well as chamber music, Hudson published the following organ piece:


#### & St Matthew's Church

**Thomas Goodburn Buffey** (1859-1922) was organist of St Mark's Church, Hull from 1878-1885, having previously been a choirboy at the church. In 1889, he was appointed as organist of St Matthew's Church, Hull, where he remained until his death. He was also organist to the 'Hull Incorporation for the Poor' and a member of the original committee for the Hull and East Riding Music School. Buffey published the following organ piece:






#### St Mary's Church, Lowgate

Walter Porter FRCO (1856-1935) was born in Boston, Lincolnshire and became a chorister at St Botolph's Parish Church in 1864. He was taught by Walter Gilbert and Daniel Wood. His first organist's appointment was at Bourne Abbey Church, Lincolnshire in 1874. The following year, he moved to St Mary's Church, Lowgate in Hull and remained in that post for nearly fifty years. He became the conductor of the Hull Harmonic Society in 1885 and was the first secretary of the Hull and East Riding College of Music when it was founded in 1903. He died on July the 4<sup>th</sup> 1935. He composed a mass setting, Te Deum, hymn tunes, a string quartet and piano works. In addition, Porter published the following organ pieces:





Frederick Harper FRCO (1865-1900) held posts as organist of St Charles' Roman Catholic Church, Hull and Albion Congregational Church, Hull. In 1891, Harper became conductor of the Hull Musical Union. He was described by a contemporary as 'an exceptionally able musician. A brilliant pianist, a ready and facile accompanist, his death in 1900, at the early age of thirty-five, was a distinct loss to music in Hull'. ## 7. Organ of the Month

'The Organ of the Month' consists of a series of articles looking at different local instruments and this month features the organs in:

#### St Clement's Church

#### **Current Organ**

Builder: Willis

Year: 1877

2 manuals and pedals



The organ in the church of St Clement and St Mary was installed in 1877 by Henry Willis (London) and extended in 1924 by Thomas E Hughes (Manningham, Bradford). The changes made by Hughes are seen in the specifications on the next page.

To celebrate the inauguration of the original organ, three events were held on January the 31<sup>st</sup> (Wednesday) 1877. A service was led in the morning by the Archbishop. Then, Mr Henry Willis gave a recital in the afternoon (3 o'clock). Finally, an evening service was led by Rev. James Palmes (Escrick). Mr Willis played the organ for both services, as well as his recital and it was said that "the choir (surpliced) rendered the music in a very pleasing manner, and the whole service was most hearty and enjoyable."

At this point, the congregation still needed to raise between £100 and £200 for the organ, whose total cost was approximately £650.

#### A contemporary account of the organ, states:

"Unfortunately the instrument, on account of the architectural features of the church, is obliged to be placed in a side chamber, too circumscribed for allowing either a free dispersion of its sounds, or roomy enough for containing certain of the stops in the swell organ complete and throughout. For instance the open diapason of the well organ has "closed bass" pipes in its lower region because there is not height enough for a full-sized swell-box in the chamber. This detracts much from the grandeur of the instrument, but is unavoidable. When architects shall have realised the importance of an organ as an essential ingredient in carrying out the church service, the, perhaps, organs will be allowed to stand out in the light of day and not be stuck into any recess or corner out of the way as they penerally are at present. The instrument in St Clement's church has two manuals and a pedal organ."









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#### The contemporary account, continues:

"On the manual of the "great organ" there is a new feature of a very considerable interest to lovers of the organ, namely, a "Contra Gamba" of 16 feet tone. This is a remarkably fine reedy stop, almost equal to a free reed stop, and is pungent, penetrating, and very quick of speech. The open diapason of this manual is of six inches and a half scale, and it has all the full and cheerful ringing quality of the best king of English diapason tone about it. The viol di gambi tone and Dulciana, on the same manual, are as fine specimens of scaling and voicing as could be well wished for, and they are as prompt and quick of speech as to be heard on the instant of the key's pressure. The couple of flute-work stops on this manual -Claribel flute and flute harmonic – each show a distinctive quality of timbre, while both realist the pure flute sound. Indeed, it is a grand feature, in the organ under notice, that its various stops have such distinctive individuality of tone, while they combine so beautifully to form tonal ensemble. A principal and fifteenth complete the flute-work stops of the great organ, but they are supplemented by two fine reeds — a trumpet and a clarionet —both excellent specimens of reedvoicing. The swell organ's defective size we have accounted for above; it is, however, of full compass, namely from CC to G in alt. The Lieblich gedact in this organ possesses a very pure, soft, fluty, and genial tone, also the Salicional stop on this manual has a dreamy, ready quality about it that is very pleasant. The Vox Angelica is one of the softest voiced stops in an organ, and in St Clement's instrument there is a stop of this kind, whose voice is so soft, and withal so sweet, that the sounds seems just to enter the ear and then become immediately evanescent. It is a masterpiece of scaling, voicing, and wind registering in the stop we mention. There is a good Gemshorn of four feet tone on this manual. It s tone is clear and travelling. A Cornopean and hautboy, each eight feet toned reeds, complete the number of stops on the swell organ register. The oboe has the fine wailing voice characteristic of the instrument when it is caught by a master of reed voicing. The pedal organ has an open diapason of sixteen feet tone, and also a bourdon of the same tone size. These stops give great dignity to the chorus stops - of eight feet - for they give out a wonderful body of tone of a ponderous, full, and round quality. The instrument has the usual couplers and composition mechanism; and the pedals are both radiating and convex, which constitutes them of easy and facile command under the feet of the player. York now possesses specimens of two of the most celebrated metropolitan organ-builders, and, little doubt, but connoisseurs of organ tone will make pilgrimages to the Minster, and to St Clement's church, to judge for themselves how high, as distinctive tone producers, our best English organ-builders stand."
